### The Director General of OHK witnessed poverty alleviation accomplishments in post-pandemic overseas project visits

In July and September 2023, Kalina Tsang, Director General of Oxfam Hong Kong (OHK), travelled to Wangjinzhuang in Hebei province, mainland China and Kenya, Africa, to visit OHK's poverty alleviation projects.

In Wangjinzhuang Village, Kalina witnessed the resilience and determination of female smallholder farmers and how they applied their traditional wisdom with technology to cope with climate change and maintain agricultural biodiversity.

In Kenya, Kalina visited herder families in the Turkana nomadic community and learned how OHK had applied innovative technologies to build solar water supply systems to alleviate the villagers' water shortage problems.

### The Education Bureau and Oxford University recognised our Pay-for-Success "Start from the Beginning" project

The first "Pay-for-Success" (PFS) project in Hong Kong, "Start from the Beginning - Chinese Supporting Scheme for Non-Chinese Speaking (NCS) Students in Kindergarten", was launched by OHK and commissioned by the Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Fund (SIE Fund). The project has achieved notable results in helping NCS kindergarten students improve their Chinese proficiency and learning motivation and strengthening kindergarten teachers' pedagogical knowledge and skills in teaching Chinese as a second language. This project has also successfully narrowed the gap in Chinese language proficiency between non-Chinese and Chinese-speaking students and provided NCS students with more opportunities for future education and employment to achieve upward mobility.

The teaching and learning resources developed in the project were adopted by the Education Bureau and made available on their website for easier access to teachers and parents. Additionally, the project was included as a case study in the Oxford University Social Impact Bond Database.

### OHK's migrant children project recognised as a top-five case study in child welfare

OHK worked with a local partner, Jinan Huaiyin Jicheng Community Social Service Centre, to implement a project to support migrant children in Jinan City. The project invited university students to assist migrant children with their homework and has contributed to improving the children's academic performance and self-confidence. One of the key activities of the project, "Meeting with Social Workers at 4:30 pm," was acknowledged by the Shandong Social Work Association as one of the top-five case studies in child welfare and the protection of children in Shandong Province.

### OHK received a grant for climate finance and resilience work in Nepal and Bangladesh

We received a grant of USD 200,000 from the Rockefeller Brothers Fund to support Oxfam's climate finance and resilience work in Nepal and Bangladesh for 1.5 years. The grant will support initiatives ranging from enhancing key players' understanding of climate adaptation finance, engaging climate financiers in inclusive development and strengthening climate resilience at the community level, to sharing valuable lessons learned with the wider civil society.



### The Oxfam "Dress Green Day" received support from corporates and schools

This fundraising event was held at a primary school in Macau on 9 June. The students were encouraged to dress in green in response to World Environment Day on 5 June and donate the cost of a day's lunch to help improve the lives of vulnerable communities. Each donor received an Oxfam Mr Earth badge. The event was sponsored by long-term Oxfam supporter Banco Comercial de Macau (BCM) who encouraged its staff to wear green or dress casually on the same day to echo the event. The bank also promoted a healthy diet and environmental protection among its employees.

# FOREWORD

## DEAR OXFAM FRIENDS,

As we reflect on the past year, we are struck by the profound challenges the world has faced – wars, conflicts, hunger, and the ever-looming threat of the climate crisis. Yet, in the face of these daunting obstacles, we find inspiration in your unwavering support and the commitment of the Oxfam community.

This annual report is a testament to the power of collective action. Within these pages, you will find stories of hope and transformation – communities empowered, lives improved, and a vision for a more just, equitable, and sustainable world brought closer to reality.

Here are some highlights that were made possible with your support:

- This year, we witnessed a growing trend of more destructive climate disasters. In September 2023, our city of Hong Kong was hit by a super typhoon and unprecedented rainstorms that brought the city to a standstill. We immediately worked with our partner to respond to the urgent needs of residents living in subdivided flats who were hit hardest by the extreme weather. It is clear that climate change is not just an environmental issue, it affects the poorest first and worst.
- Our humanitarian response continued to deliver food, water, sanitation, and hygiene measures to people in need. We supported 21 humanitarian projects in 11 countries and regions around the globe, assisting more than 1,360,000 people to improve their resilience and reduce their vulnerability. This included the cyclone-affected people in Malawi, the flood-affected people in Pakistan and the Typhoon Doksuri-affected communities in mainland China and the Philippines. You'll also learn more about our humanitarian response to the earthquake in Qinghai, mainland China, the food crisis in East Africa and our humanitarian work in Gaza.
- On the other side of the world in Kenya, our Oxfam team took innovative steps to address water scarcity issues worsened by climate change. As the lead

agency for water and sanitation, we collaborated with a local partner to develop a solar-powered water pump system which uses solar energy to draw water from 60 metres underground and fill a large storage tank to meet the daily needs of entire villages. Additionally, in a poor urban settlement in Ethiopia where farmland is limited, we established model vegetable gardening sites in primary schools. We provided drip irrigation technology and introduced vertical farming techniques to address food insecurity and improve nutrition for 1,137 students from low-income families.

- To raise awareness of climate change and how to adapt to it, we launched climate change photography exhibitions in Hong Kong, Beijing, mainland China and Macau. Additionally, on the eve of the 2023 United Nations Climate Change Conference, we released a case study which examines the climate challenges faced by eight vulnerable urban and rural communities in Hong Kong, mainland China, and other Asian countries and regions over the past few years.
- We made strong efforts to influence policy advocacy through our Hong Kong Poverty Report 2023. We submitted the report for the Chief Executive's 2023 Policy Address consultation. The government responded to our recommendations, including reviewing the minimum wage, establishing a community living room programme, expanding childcare services, and strengthening retraining schemes for middle-aged to young-old individuals in the Policy Address. We also worked with our partners to help young people from ethnic minority backgrounds in Hong Kong and SEN (Special Educational Needs) youths in Macau enter the workplace through training and internships.

These impactful accomplishments have been possible with and because of you – our dedicated supporters and partners whose generosity and compassion have inspired us every single day. Thank you, from the bottom of our hearts, for your steadfast support. We eagerly look forward to what we will accomplish next.

# HOW WE WORK

At Oxfam, we understand that poverty is a complex issue that needs to be tackled using a sustainable and holistic approach, or what we call our one programme approach. This approach goes beyond simply patching problems. Instead, our programmes link development, humanitarian and influencing work in pursuit of common objectives to fight poverty.

We also take a rights-based approach to our work. This means we believe everyone has the right to live free of poverty.

We can't do any of this on our own though. We rely on strong partnerships and collective action in order to effect change.

Partnering with people who experience poverty, partner organisations, donors and all of our supporters is indispensable to our work. In fact, building a strong network of collaborators is integral to realising a world without poverty.

## MONITORING, EVALUATING AND LEARNING

To ensure our work is effective, we regularly monitor, evaluate and learn from our projects and programmes. At the core of this process is the participation of various stakeholders, especially the vulnerable groups with whom we work. Aside from relying on the expertise of our programme staff and local partners, communities themselves identify their needs and give feedback, and we work together to find sustainable and innovative solutions.

## YUON FUK LUNG

### PRINCIPAL OF THE BUDDHIST FAT HO MEMORIAL COLLEGE

Every year I participate in the Oxfam Trailwalker (OTW) with teachers and students from the college. I myself have participated in 17 OTWs, including one overseas OTW. This year we had 6 teams from the college with 24 students and teachers. I am proud to say that we all completed the 100km course except one student who was injured along the way and had to drop out.

We have supported OTW for many years. The event helps us develop our perseverance and build team spirit. Among our six teams this year, HUI Chun Wai, a member of Team 0744, participated in the event for the first time. He has lacked confidence since he was a child and in order to encourage him, I practiced with him on mountain walks. During the race, Chun Wai strained his leg at checkpoint 3, but he didn't give up. He and his teammates overcame all difficulties and completed the course in 38 hours and 24 minutes. All the teachers and students in the school were very moved. The most encouraging thing is that Chun Wai has learned to communicate with others and express himself through the OTW.

## CARBON-NEUTRAL TEA

Liugou Village, in southern Shaanxi Province in mainland China, has been growing tea for generations. However, heavy rains in 2012 destroyed many of the villagers' crops and houses, threatening their lives and livelihoods.

Oxfam has been working in Liugou Village since 2013 to help the villagers reduce the risk of disasters and adapt to climate change. The project has achieved remarkable results in improving livelihoods and enhancing the villagers' awareness of disaster prevention. Last year, together with our local partner, we continued to support the villagers in growing and producing low-carbon tea and improving the ecological environment of the village. This has strengthened the villagers' ability to sustain the development of the community over the long term. Our work included:

- Building effective water-saving irrigation facilities and enhancing the resilience of tea gardens to withstand natural disasters and cope with extreme weather.
- Establishing a resource recycling centre to promote the reuse of organic waste.
- Establishing a low-carbon tea processing plant and encouraging villagers to participate in the design of environmentally friendly tea packaging.
- Exploring eco-tourism with low-carbon tea as a selling point to develop additional sources of income.

The long-term goal of Oxfam's Liugou Village project is to increase the villagers' sustainable income by improving their planting skills and achieving carbon-neutral tea production. We also encourage women to get out of their homes and participate in discussions and decision-making on community development, climate change adaptation and ecological environment protection.

## HELPING LOW-INCOME FAMILIES IN HONG KONG TO COPE WITH EXTREME RAINSTORMS

On 7 September 2023, Hong Kong recorded 158.1 millimetres of rain in a single hour! This was the heaviest one-hour rainfall on record. The homes of many low-income families living on lower floors, especially those in vulnerable subdivided flats, as well as the homes at rooftop, were damaged, posing health and safety risks. In response, Oxfam and its partner provided immediate emergency assistance to affected families, including repairs, replacement of damaged furniture and other measures to help them get back to their normal lives as soon as possible.

Ms Ko is a single mother with a school-age son. They live in a subdivided flat of about 70 sq. ft. in Tai Po. The heavy rains on 7 September last year caused water seepage into the walls of their home. Due to insufficient ventilation through the windows, even though Ms Ko wiped the walls every day, she couldn't prevent mould from growing on the walls.

Oxfam helped Ms Ko buy a dehumidifier and a fan to improve the indoor ventilation in her home and prevent dampness in the walls, and to improve the respiratory health of Ms Ko and her son.

# SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS IN JUST ECONOMIES

## SUPPORTING THE YOUNG WITH SPECIAL EDUCATION NEEDS TO ENTER THE WORKFORCE

In recent years, the number of students with special educational needs (SEN) in Macau has continued to increase. Although public concern for SEN students has improved, and there is more support in schools, it is still difficult for SEN students to enter the workforce.

Due to insufficient employment training and difficulty in finding a job, SEN youths are disoriented and may develop emotional and behavioural problems.

Oxfam worked with its partner the "Bosco Youth Service Network" to provide employment support for SEN youths, especially those with autism. The support included:

- Vocational training to improve students' interpersonal relationships and interview and problem-solving skills.
- Emotional and psychological counselling to improve their ability to cope with stress and challenges.
- Providing internship opportunities at the Bosco Green Store, and referrals to other restaurants, drug stores and supermarkets to accumulate work experience.



Lio Gaspar Filomena couldn't find a job during covid. She felt depressed and went to a social worker for help. It was then she discovered that she had been suffering from a developmental disorder since childhood. After participating in our project, her confidence improved and she learned to accept herself. She was then hired as a part-time shop assistant at the Bosco Green Store because of her good performance.

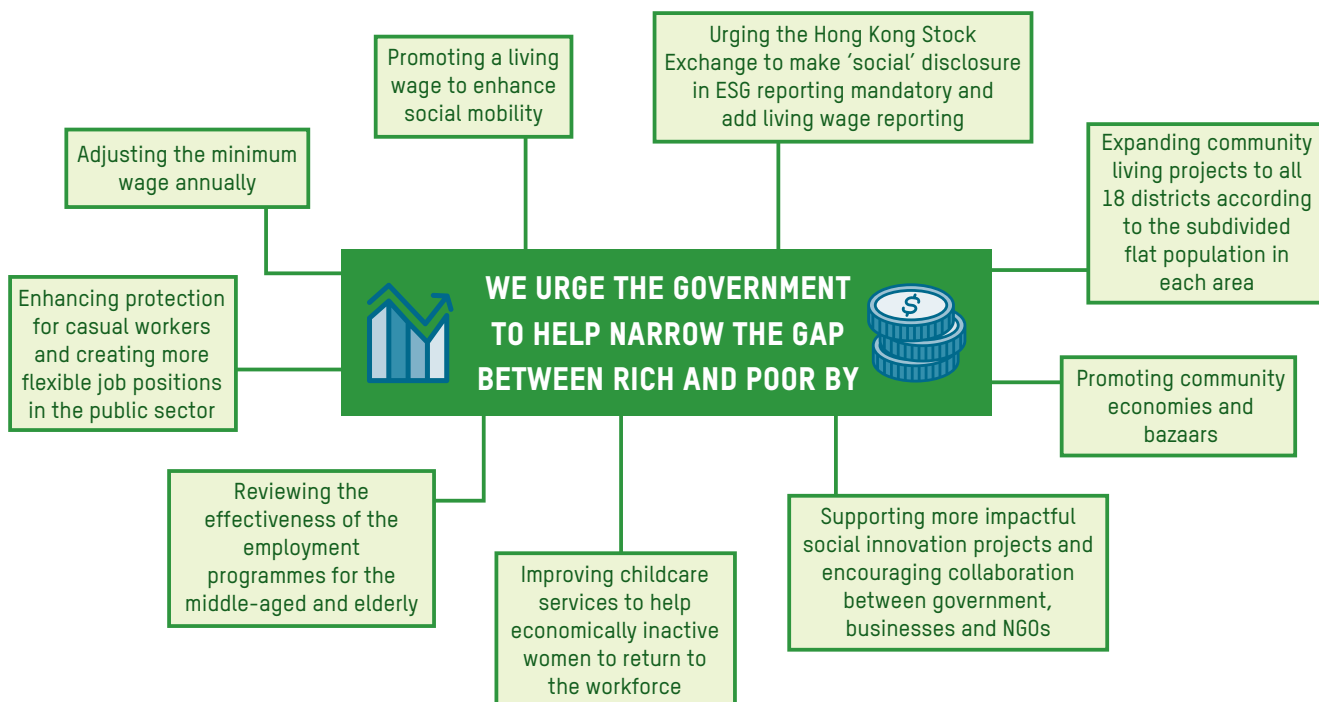


## HONG KONG POVERTY REPORT

In September 2023, Oxfam published the "Hong Kong Poverty Report 2023: A Polarised Recovery in the Post-Pandemic Era". We found that in the first quarter after the pandemic, more than 1.36 million people, which is 20% of the population, were living in poverty.

This shows that only high-income families have benefitted from the economic recovery, while low-income families continue to face challenges.

THE GAP IN THE MEDIAN MONTHLY INCOME BETWEEN THE POOREST AND RICHEST 10% OF HOUSEHOLDS IN HONG KONG WIDENED FROM 34.3 TIMES IN 2019 TO 57.7 TIMES IN THE FIRST QUARTER OF 2023.





# HUMANITARIAN RELIEF

## GAZA CRISIS

On 7 October 2023, a serious conflict broke out between Israel and Palestine, causing huge civilian casualties with many more now on the verge of famine. With the medical system devastated, more than two million people were in dire need of humanitarian aid. Despite the logistical challenges and unprecedented obstacles, as of the end of March 2024, Oxfam and its partners reached 263,000 people with relief which included:

## PROVIDING LIFE-SAVING WATER

Gaza's water and sanitation systems have been devastated. Water supply is now at 7-17% of pre-conflict levels due to infrastructure damage and fuel shortages. These, along with deteriorating sanitation, lack of hygiene supplies, and overcrowding, increase the risk of disease outbreaks.

Oxfam and local partners used core reverse osmosis technology and solar power supply systems for five underground saltwater desalination facilities in the temporary settlements of Rafah and Khan Younis. The units provide an average of three litres of clean water per person per day to protect people's health. We have installed an additional 76 water-storage airbags, each with a capacity of 5 cubic metres, and provided plastic buckets to help people access the water.

Oxfam has been working in the Occupied Palestinian Territory and Israel since the 1950s, providing clean water and sanitation facilities and cash assistance to poor families.

AS OF MARCH 2024, FIVE DESALINATION PLANTS HAVE BEEN PUT INTO OPERATION, PROVIDING 3 LITRES OF DRINKING WATER PER PERSON PER DAY TO 10,500 DISPLACED PEOPLE IN RAFAH AND KHAN YOUNIS.

## EAST AFRICA FOOD CRISIS

In April 2023, Somalia, Kenya and Ethiopia were hit by devastating floods affecting over 1.5 million people. Some areas in Ethiopia were also affected by drought, conflict and floods, forcing many refugees to return to refugee camps in South Sudan.

This led to serious food shortages in the camps and an increase in rape and sexual assault against women and children. Oxfam provided humanitarian assistance to the South Sudan refugees. This included:

- Providing emergency cash for children whose primary caretakers had left home to find work; helping households headed by single women to buy food and essentials to prevent the women from selling themselves in exchange for food and necessities.
- Repairing water supply facilities and promoting better sanitation to reduce infectious diseases.
- Installing toilets and showers with lights to reduce the risk of sexual assaults on women.



The local villagers were very grateful for the aid – especially cooking stoves which they thought could last for more than 20 years.



## QINGHAI EARTHQUAKE

On 18 December 2023, a 6.2-magnitude earthquake struck Qinghai Province affecting 419 villages in 46 townships. The affected communities struggling to find shelter in the bitter winter cold urgently needed relief.

Oxfam Hong Kong received a grant of HK\$5,986,000 from the Hong Kong SAR Disaster Relief Fund to provide food and quilts to 7,500 households in 34 towns in Haidong County, Xunhua County and Hualong County. We especially focused on the needs of women. After receiving the relief supplies, the villagers had to sign a receipt to ensure transparency. We will help villages with post-disaster recovery projects to help them improve their livelihoods and adapt to climate change.

## EDUCATION TO END THE SCOURGE OF CHILD MARRIAGE

Due to persistent poverty and traditional norms, parents often marry off their daughters at a young age in exchange for a dowry, denying them the educational and developmental opportunities that schooling could provide. As a result, an alarming 12% of girls who do enrol in school end up dropping out. In fact, for every 100 girls who start Primary 1, only three will progress to secondary school.

Oxfam believes continued investment in education and gender empowerment can break the cycle of intergenerational poverty and marginalisation that has long constrained opportunities for girls. We have worked tirelessly with our local partners to equip vulnerable children with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to overcome the obstacles they faced. The project included:

- Providing bursaries to 1,002 vulnerable children to enhance secondary school enrolment.
- Distributing bicycles to reduce long commute times to school and help lower dropout rates.
- Providing solar lamps to enable girls to study at night.

Brenda Kamoto is a primary school student. She participated in Oxfam's education and girls' empowerment programmes, where she gained the crucial knowledge and tools to navigate issues like gender-based violence and child marriage. Deeply grateful for these transformative opportunities, she was saddened to see so many of her peers being denied access to life-changing educational opportunities.

Education and gender equality are fundamental human rights. Oxfam has long championed the empowerment of impoverished, marginalised women and girls and supported them in breaking free from traditional gender roles and child marriages to pursue brighter futures.



## EMPOWERING ETHNIC MINORITY YOUTH WITH SKILLS AND EMPLOYMENT

Many ethnic minority youth, especially women, in Hong Kong have very limited employment opportunities due to their lack of proficiency in Chinese. This means it is difficult for them to escape poverty.

The number of non-Chinese speaking (NCS) students in Hong Kong is increasing every year. But there is a serious shortage of NCS teaching staff with ethnic minority backgrounds. This reduces the learning support for ethnic minority children.

To address this problem, Oxfam Hong Kong launched the “Foundation Certificate in Early Childhood Care and Education for Non-Chinese Speaking Learners” with support from the Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Fund (SIE Fund) and the Kerry Group. The certificate enables ethnic minority youth to explore possible careers in early childhood education and provides ethnic minority children with better support at school.

The programme also helped young ethnic minority women become teaching assistants and provided employment referrals for any who had passed the written exam and had completed the practicum, and this is changing some of the entrenched attitudes of parents regarding their children's employment choices.

## OXFAM TRAILWALKER 2023

This year's Oxfam Trailwalker (OTW) attracted 776 teams with a total of 3,104 participants. 70% of the entrants were participating for the first time. Corporate teams also reached a new record with 283 teams. Team no. 8001 was the first team to complete the OTW 2023. The team completed the course in 12 hours and 42 minutes.

All funds raised will support OHK's poverty alleviation projects, disaster relief and advocacy work to improve the lives of people living in poverty in Hong Kong and around the world.

## OXFAM MUSICAL MARATHON

The theme of this year's Musical Marathon was to 'Compose a Humanitarian Movement'. A passionate group of philanthropists shared their movements at the Hong Kong Arts Centre and on our YouTube channel from July to September.

Their efforts aimed to support disaster-affected communities experiencing poverty and raise funds for our poverty alleviation programmes in Hong Kong and around the world.



## OXFAM RICE EVENT

The Oxfam Rice Event returned for the first time after the pandemic with a theme of 'Fight climate change, empower smallholder farmers'.

We set up 47 rice stalls in Hong Kong, Kowloon and the New Territories for two consecutive weekends from 10 June 2023. Artists Tony Hung and Stefan Wong attended the opening ceremony.

Around 1,000 volunteers helped to sell rice to support our poverty alleviation work. Through this fundraising event, we can work with smallholder farmers in many countries to help them prepare for disasters and adapt to climate change.

## OXFAM TOWERRUN

The 10th Oxfam TowerRun was held at the Macau Tower on October 22 last year.

The event received international accreditation from the Towerrunning World Association (TWA) and the Asia-Pacific Vertical Marathon Association (AVA).

Over 530 participants took part and every step they took helped alleviate poverty, provide disaster relief, and fund development initiatives in Macau, Hong Kong, and worldwide.







## EAT FAIR CAMPAIGN

We introduced the “Eat Fair Campaign” in Hong Kong and Macau.

Through a series of experiential workshops, online challenges and illustrations, we hoped to encourage discussion on the relationship between poverty and food crises among the public and inspire more people to promote low-carbon emissions and help alleviate poverty.

The programme also launched “Eat Fair Schools”, “Eat Fair Shops” and “Eat Fair Corporates” campaigns and called for schools, restaurants, shops and companies to engage in “Eat Fair” actions which included organising educational talks, vegetarian days and fundraising activities and selling vegetarian, low-carbon emission, or fair-trade food.



## THE NEW OXFAM EDUCATION CENTRE

In order to be closer to the grassroots community, we relocated our Education Centre to Kwun Tong.

The centre provides innovative, interactive, and experiential educational activities and workshops for students, parents, and the general public to help nurture a new generation of global citizens.

Through interactive theatre, field trips, simulation experiences, and games, participants learn about issues such as wealth disparity, climate change, food crises, and sustainable development.

We also launched a newly designed “Kwun Tong Community Exploration” activity to explore hidden poverty issues in the community.

## OXFAM EXPERIENCE EXCHANGE SESSIONS

On 4 December 2023, our Oxfam Hong Kong Guangdong Office held a capacity-building and experience exchange session for grassroots organisations under the theme of “Humanitarian Relief and Disaster Preparedness and Mitigation”. Representatives from 16 foundations and NGOs

from different regions in the Mainland shared and exchanged experiences in humanitarian response.



## GRANT FOR GOOD

We were appointed by the Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship Fund (SIE Fund) in March 2023 to create the “Oxfam Grant for Good”.

Along with our strategic partner, Cyberport, we encouraged people from all walks of life to come up with innovative solutions to address poverty and social exclusion. So far, we have received more than 300 solutions and we have more than 10 projects currently in progress.

These projects aim to support low-income families and those living in cramped subdivided units, the elderly, ethnic minorities, people with disabilities and children with special educational needs.

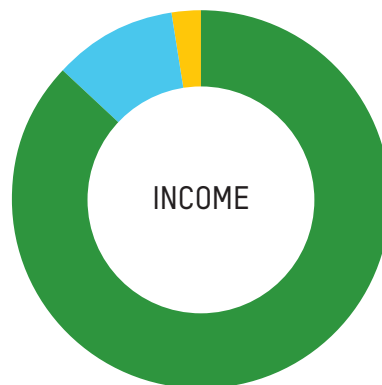




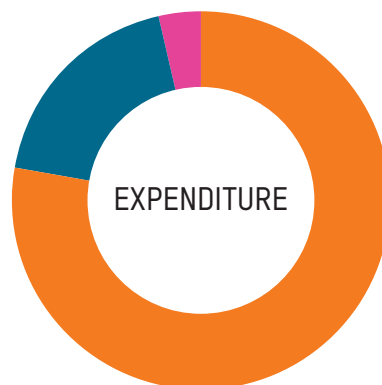

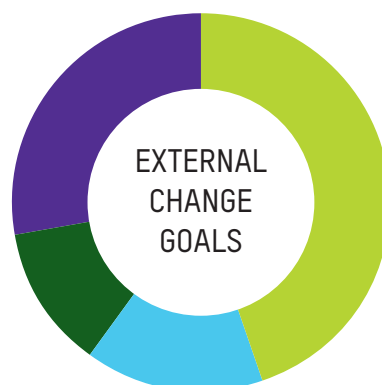

# FINANCIAL REPORT

## CONTINUOUS PUBLIC SUPPORT

We are grateful for the generosity of our donors who have continued to support us under this challenging fundraising environment. Donations from the public amounted to HK\$172.4 million, which represented 87% of our total revenue.

This year, we raised HK\$3.4 million from the public for disaster relief work. This included HK\$2.7 million for the Gaza Crisis and HK\$0.6 million for the earthquake in Türkiye and Syria.

The Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Disaster Relief Fund granted us HK\$16.9 million to provide disaster relief support, including HK\$2.4 million for the Cyclone in Malawi, HK\$4.1 million for the Typhoon in the Philippines, HK\$4.6 million for the flooding in Jilin province and HK\$5.8 million for the Earthquake in Qinghai province of mainland China. Furthermore, we received HK\$4.2 million from the Government to support the projects in Hong Kong.

## INVESTMENT IN PROGRAMMES

A total of HK\$158 million was spent on programmes this year, which represented 78% of our total expenditure.

With regard to the emergencies, we spent a total of HK\$27.0 million on our humanitarian responses, including HK\$7.8 million for the Earthquakes in Türkiye and Syria and Qinghai province of mainland China, HK\$4.8 million for the Typhoon in the Philippines, HK\$2.4 million for the Cyclone in Malawi, HK\$5.3 million for floods in mainland China and HK\$3.1 million for the humanitarian crises in Bangladesh, Uganda and Gaza. Moreover, HK\$3.6 million was spent on recurrent emergencies such as public health, cyclical and climate-related disasters in mainland China and other places around the world.

We categorise our programme expenditure by External Change Goals; the goal we invested in the most was Sustainable Livelihood in Just Economies, which amounted to HK\$71 million, or 45% of our total expenditure. Through this goal, we aim to secure and enhance sustainable livelihoods in a just economy. We also spent HK\$43.2 million on the goal Humanitarian Relief. Through this goal, we aim to support vulnerable communities to build resilience to disasters and provide life-saving support during emergencies. Highly concerned about the climate, we spent HK\$19.6 million on this goal. Our work in this area aims to mitigate the impacts of climate change on vulnerable and poor communities and support them as they adapt to it. We also spent HK\$24.0 million on the goal Gender Justice this year. Through this goal, we aim to advance gender equality and eliminate gender-based discrimination.

## RESERVES

In 2023/24, we recorded a deficit of HK\$4.1 million. At the end of the financial year, our reserves stood at HK\$135.3 million, representing a decrease of 3% from last year. The reserves include HK\$16 million in restricted funds and HK\$119.3 million in operation reserves. This demonstrates that we have been able to maintain and ensure our financial health.

## ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES

Whenever we make an appeal for a humanitarian disaster, we cover the core operational costs using our central funds, thereby ensuring that every dollar donated by the public goes to the urgent work at hand. A separate account is established for each emergency. We are also committed to accountability in terms of governance, compliance and controls, codes and standards, and transparency and communication (with further details on the next few pages).

## GOVERNANCE

OHK's governing body, the Council, is responsible for the organisation's legal, ethical, strategic and administrative governance, as well as risk management. The Council helps formulate our strategies, guides and monitors our work, and oversees the expenditure of our programmes. The Council has also formed and delegated specific powers to several Committees.

## COMPLIANCE & CONTROLS

As a company limited by guarantee registered in Hong Kong, OHK complies with the relevant requirements set out in the Companies Ordinance. We are also a tax-exempt charity pursuant to Section 88 of the Inland Revenue Ordinance (Cap. 112). Our charitable status is regularly reviewed and confirmed by the Inland Revenue Department.

OHK strictly adheres to the financial standards issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Oxfam Confederation Financial Standards. Our financial statements are audited in accordance with the Hong Kong Standards on Auditing and the Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards.

Internally, we devise robust systems and processes to hold ourselves and those we work with accountable. The Finance, Risk and Audit Committee, chaired by the Treasurer of the Council, meets regularly to review all financial, risk, auditing and internal control issues related to the organisation. Moreover, the Committee supervises the internal audit function within the organisation. This enables us to evaluate and improve the efficiency and effectiveness of our risk management practices, control frameworks and governance processes.

## CODES & STANDARDS

OHK upholds the highest ethical standards to protect our employees and the communities we work with. We have zero tolerance for sexual harassment, exploitation and abuse in our organisation. Our staff, partners, governance members and volunteers are all bound by Oxfam's Joint Code of Conduct. We have a comprehensive set of safeguarding policies, which include our Whistleblowing Policy. Oxfam staff and members of the public can report misconduct through our whistleblowing channels. In the 2023/24 fiscal year, one safeguarding case related to OHK was reported, but confirmed to be not upheld after investigation.

OHK also adheres to international standards, charters and best practices that guide the principles of our work on humanitarian response and disaster relief, as well as in the monitoring and evaluation of our strategies and programmes.

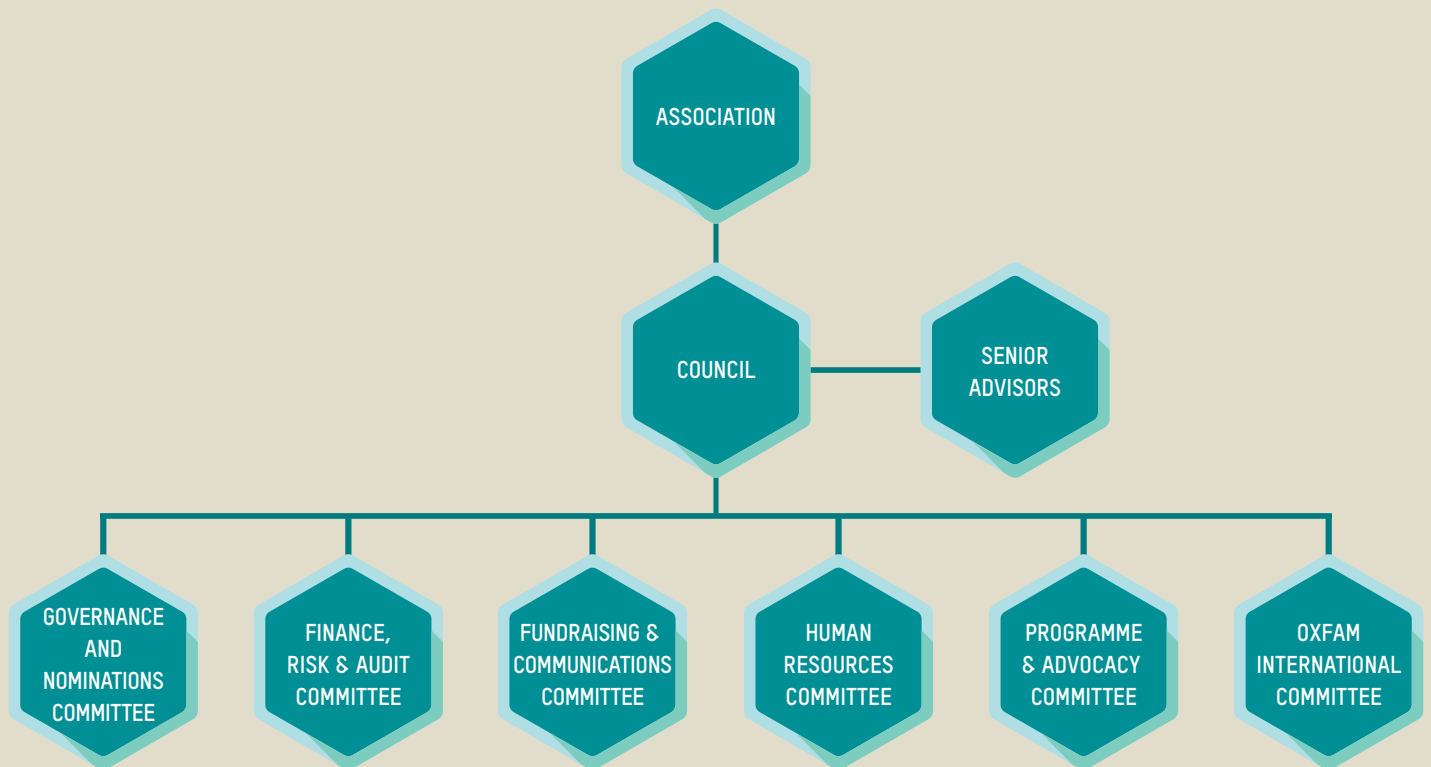

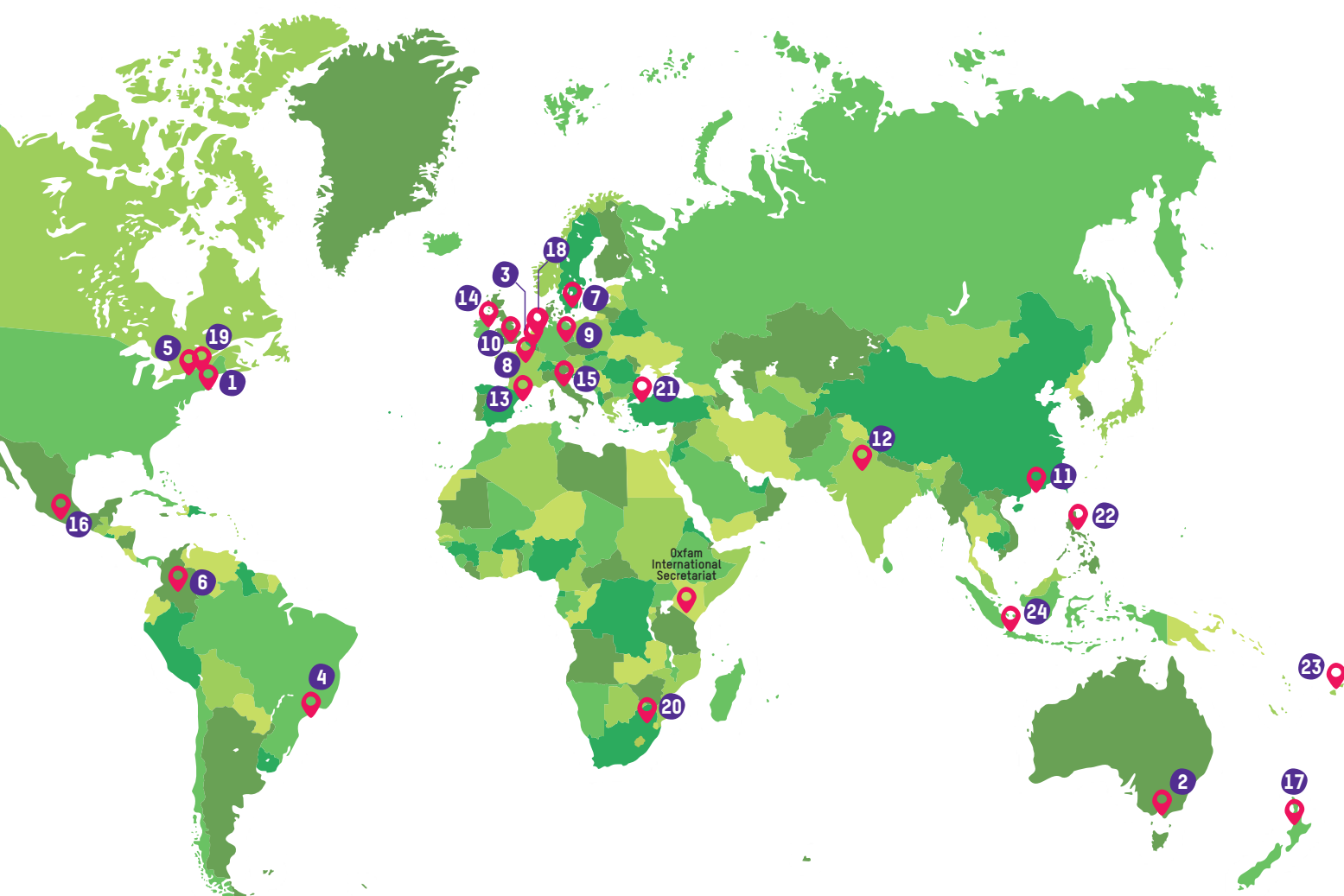
